

# Principal's Report

Principals Report Week 5 Term 3 2013.

Education Week. An afternoon tea and presentation for the Highlands Community of Schools was held at Guyra Central School on Monday 29 July to celebrate Education Week. Congratulations to Grant Ryan and Paul Gellie, who were awarded certificates of recognition for their outstanding contribution to Ben Lomond Public School. Congratulations to Amelia Wake who received a Certificate of Recognition for outstanding contribution to Ben Lomond Public School in the area of student Leadership.

Enrolments. We have welcomed Bear, Sharni, and Shae-Lee to our school and welcomed back Kody, Mervyn, Samara and Kyla. These students take our current enrolment to 16 and with the addition of Transition every second Friday our numbers are projected to be 19 for next year.

Former School Residence. Included with this newsletter is information regarding the tender for the removal of the former school residence.

Teaching and Learning. The Snow Gums Learning Alliance, consisting of Ben Lomond, Bald Blair, Chandler and Black Mountain Public Schools put forward a proposal last term for an integrated curriculum project where students from different schools would be linked via platforms such as adobe connect and videoconferencing to work on collaborative, student driven projects.

More than 300 schools across the state applied for these projects, so we are very happy to be one of only 15 projects

The students in Years 3-5 will be involved in the project over this term which will see them involved in producing their own Current Affairs Program.

This term our Connected Outcomes Group (COGs) unit is Our Australian Heritage. The students engage in: telling stories and exploring Australian heritage through Visual Arts, Music, Drama and Dance. They will research key events and people from Australia's history, investigate how animals adapt top different environments and create a book based on a personal experience and artefact.

# Students, parents, guardians and carers

This brochure explains appropriate behaviour and inappropriate behaviour for students travelling on buses.



# What are the consequences of inappropriate behaviour?

- If a student misbehaves on a bus, the bus operator concerned will contact the parents and the school.
   Depending on the oravity of the offence students
  - Depending on the gravity of the offence, students
    may be required to give up their school bus travel
    pass or may be refused travel on the bus for a
    period of time determined by the bus operator.
- Heavier penalties may apply to students involved in group misbehaviour.
- School principals have the right to take additional disciplinary action against a student under the school's discipline code or student welfare policy for any breach of the Code of Conduct.

The bus operator must provide written notification to the parents, guardians or carers before a student's school bus travel pass can be withdrawn.

# What can you do if you disagree?

If parents, guardians or carers don't agree with a decision, they should contact the bus operator. If they are still not satisfied, they can contact the nearest Ministry of Transport office. Toll-free telephone numbers for each office are listed below.

# FOR SCHOOL STUDENTS ON BUSES CODE OF CONDUCT

It is every student's responsibility to behave in a manner that ensures the safety and comfort of passengers and drivers. This includes:

# BEHAVING APPROPRIATELY

- respect the needs and comfort of other passengers (e.g. no use of offensive or racist language, fighting, spitting, placing feet on seats, throwing things in or from the bus, eating or drinking-except waterunless the bus operator gives written permission)
  - give up seats to all adults and disabled passengers adhere to the law that bans smoking on buses
    - obey reasonable directions from the driver (e.g. where to sit or to remain in the bus)
- refrain from attracting the attention of the driver keep arms, legs and heads inside the bus except in the case of emergency

# RESPECTING PROPERTY

- / protect bus property
- ensure that buses are not vandalised
  - e.g. graffiti and window etching report any vandalism

# HOLDING PASSES

- show travel passes or tickets to the driver on boarding and when requested
- use the travel pass only for its intended purpose
- 'swipe' or 'dip' passes in ticket readers if available when boarding
- keep your pass for your own use-you should not lend your pass to other students or borrow one

Disobeying these rules may lead to the withdrawal of school bus travel passes and/or prosecution. ------

The Code of Conduct was developed to ensure the safety and comfort of all passengers. It is every student's responsibility to follow the simple rules outlined in the Code.

# UNACCEPTABLE BEHAVIOUR
